September 2017

## High School

All juniors took part in PreACT testing which simulates the state mandated ACT test and provides supports for both students and teachers to use.

Freshmen and sophomores took part in ACT Aspire Periodic testing. As part of the ACT suite, results are immediate and allow for teachers to impact instruction based on this real time assessment.

P.A.R.T.Y. (Prevent Alcohol and Risk Related Trauma in Youth at the PAC) was attended by all sophomores. Messaging is about making informed decisions regarding risk taking behaviors.

## Middle School

Boomerang began for 6th grade students. Boomerang is a character education program that is available through Calumet County UW-Extension. High School students are trained as Boomerang Team Teachers over the summer and deliver eight character education lessons once a month to 6th grade classrooms.

7th grade students attended Outdoor Education at Green Lake Campground. Students stayed in Green Lake for three nights and four days and attended classes such as Senses, Mindfulness, Biking, Canoeing and Fishing.

## Elementary School

Due to PBIS training this last summer, NHES staff will be handing out "Blue Ribbon" rewards throughout the school day. When 20 Classes have earned 20 Blue Ribbons, a school wide reward will occur.

For the fourth year, our Girls on the Run program started the first week of school. We had over 30 students in the program with seven staff and family volunteers coaching. We also had our 3rd annual Pumpkin Run. This run focuses on healthy habits and community involvement.

## Academic & Career Planning

Mike Vander Zanden, CEO of Amerequip, presented on employment and life skills to our seniors. Seniors shared that this information was appropriate for all students to know.

6th grade students were introduced to Career Cruising and 8th grade students began exploring their post-secondary options.

## Community

With support from the New Holstein and Winnebago East Shore Lions Club, a Leo Club was formed and chartered with students from the middle and high schools. The local club will follow the same guiding principles and mission of the Lions Club. Initial plans are to identify service opportunities impacting our local community.



October 2017

### Elementary School

NHES students had their first Student of the Month Assembly last week. This year one student from each grade level was pick who went above and beyond showing their "Responsibly" PAWS expectations. Responsibly was our focus for the month September. October's focus in Respect. Each class with do a small mini-lesson on social skills revolving around respect.

We also recognized a teacher last month. The PAWS parent committee has set up a "Kindness" bucket in the office for parent to nominate a teacher each month.

### Middle School

Eighth grade Peer Mentors attended their training with Tim Milligan. The students left training with a greater understanding their leadership role in their school and a better understanding of how they can lend a hand to one another. They were also able to brainstorm ideas that they'd like to carry out throughout the school year to keep school a positive place.

### High School

Nationally known speaker Eddie Slowitowski energized and engaged the junior and senior classes from both New Holstein and Kiel High Schools. His message was to deliver the "best version of you" to everyone, everyday.

Freshmen and sophomores took part in an Autism Awareness presentation lead by CESA 7 Autism specialist Elizabeth Langteau. Highlights of the presentation were students sharing out their stories about what makes them different from their peers but still in need of their supports.

### Academic & Career Planning

A Financial Aid Night was held for all seniors and their parents. Highlights of the meeting included promotion of our local scholarship programs and upcoming opportunities. In addition, families were provided with tips on completing the FAFSA form.

Mr Zoelle, HS Guidance Counselor, presented to freshmen on the value of credits, high school course planning, and study habits.

Mr. Olig, HS Principal, discussed next level opportunities with sophomores. Topics covered included AP Courses, School to Work, Youth Apprenticeship and service learning.

### Community

The High School Cross Country team members engaged in helping with the promotion and running of the Run Tall 5K race. Members sported t-shirts and encouraged others to participate as well as informing on the benefits of the race to elementary and middle school students. Great job Husky runners!



## November 2017

### High School

During an assembly on November 10, we recognized a number of students during our 1st Quarter Awards Assembly. Those recognized included our Students of the Month for September and October, Positive Write Up recipients (17) and 208 of 367 students were eligible for our PBIS Student of the Quarter. Students are eligible based on having no office referrals or attendance issues.

The *Be The Change* group created and posted positive signs about the school regarding self-esteem. This group was formed after the initial Challenge Day event was held at New Holstein High School three years ago.

### Middle School

NHMS hosted Challenge Day! This was our fourth year hosting CD, but our first year hosting in the Middle School.

Students attended a Sexting Presentation put on by the Sexual Assault Crisis Center and the Calumet County DA. The presentation encouraged students to make positive decisions online and informed them how their digital decisions can impact them now and for a lifetime.

New this year were Students of the Quarter nominations. Approximately 40 students were acknowledged by each subject area in each grade level, based on our PBIS core value (Be Respectful, Responsible, Productive and Safe). Award winners took part in a lunch party to celebrate their accomplishment.

### Elementary School

The NHES PBIS committee members had their last PBIS professional development this month. We are looking forward to being recognised as PBIS school. We have to data driven surveys to take as a whole staff and as a PBIS committee. We will be having a DPI walkthrough to get a baseline of PBIS fidelity from staff students.

### Academic & Career Planning

The High School Guidance Office completed meetings with all seniors on high school credit completion, next level plans, and scholarship work.

### Community

The New Holstein School District Leo Club kicked off its first service projects which were a glasses drive and toy drive to benefit Children's Hospitals of Wisconsin. Donations from students and staff were 285 toys.

Eleven community members served as adult participants in November's Challenge Day for our Middle School students.



## December 2017

### High School

The Student Council held their second blood drive of the year. As part of the mission of the Student Council to serve others, we were again able to increase our donations and community donations were up as well despite a local drive less than two weeks earlier.

The *Be the Change* group's message for the month was Thank You! Thank You signs were posted at all offices and classrooms to recognize the dedication and commitment of our employees.

### Middle School

The day before Thanksgiving and Christmas Break student took part in PBIS events. In Nov. student took part in a movie and popcorn in the auditorium preceded by the annual Staff vs. 8th grade Girls Volleyball team match. Prior to Christmas break, we held our annual staff vs. 8th Grade Boys Bball match, followed by a Smartpants Smackdown Trivia contest. Winning Trivia Teams will get a lunch at DQ in January.

In the afternoon of Dec. 22nd, student went to the auditorium to take part in Reptile Mania presented by the Science Alliance. Students learned about the science behind reptiles and got to hold/touch several reptilian creatures.

### Elementary School

The students from the Girls on the Run program participated in a local community project. They held a Bake Sale and Pet Toy drive to help out a local animal shelter. The girls raised over \$500 for the shelter and gathered over 50 toys for the animals. This project was a way for the girls to give back to the community.

### Academic & Career Planning

Eighth grade students practice exploring for their future. Students use Career Cruising (an online portal) to research the differences between two year colleges, four year public/private colleges and technical colleges.

### Community

The High School Art Club, National Art Honor Society, FFA, Student Council, and National Honor Society students took part in the Country Christmas program at New Holstein High School. As part of the mission of each student group, students provided activities, refreshments, and direction to the many people in attendance.





# January/February 2018

## Middle School

Can I Kiss You? Assembly - On January 25th 8th-12th grade students attended a presentation by Mike Domiritz on respectful and safe dating practices.

The end of January, the whole school met to hold our Student of the Quarter Assembly to recognize students who stood out in the areas of performance, attitude, participation, effort, and/or improvement. Forty MS students were honored across all subject areas.

## Elementary School:

On February 9th, we had our 2nd School wide PBIS reward day. One student was picked from the student of the month to "punch" in a cup and pick a reward. The reward was PJ's day!

Our PBIS focus was safety. Students from 5th grade made videos in regards to our school wide expectations. Teachers showed the videos throughout the month of February in the classrooms to re-teach students our expectations.

GOTR (Girls on the Run) program created a community project to give back to New Holstein. The girls in the program decided to raise money for a local animal shelter. They did a bake sale and pet toy drive. The girls sold the bake goods during the winter concert and did the toy drive during the month of September. They raised over \$500 for the animal shelter.

## High School

Quarter 2/Semester 1 awards were presented to our students at an assembly in February. In all, 36 students were recognized with Positive Behavior Awards along with 217 of our 366 students were eligible for Attendance and Behavior Awards. The main focus of our Be Statements this quarter was respect and responsibility.

Juniors completed the ACT and ACT Workkeys statewide assessments at the end of February.

## Academic & Career Planning

The High School sophomores completed the ASVAB test provided by the military. Results were shared out in Sophomore Social Studies classes. The ASVAB also provides you with career information for various civilian and military occupations and is an indicator for success in future endeavors whether you choose to go to college, vocational school, or a military career.

Quarter three students in Guidance & Careers 8 are beginning their research on apprenticeships, technical, community and four year colleges.

Eighth grade students meet with Ms. Mertens for mini conferences to choose their freshman courses.

## Community

All students in grades 6-12 took part in the Calumet County YRBS (Youth Risk Behavior Survey). The survey monitors six categories of health-related behaviors that contribute to the leading causes of death and disability among youth and adults, including behaviors that contribute to unintentional injuries and violence, sexual behaviors related to unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV infection, alcohol and other drug use, tobacco use, unhealthy dietary behaviors, and inadequate physical activity. Results should be available by July to individual schools.





## March 2018

### High School

Be the Change group focused on relationship building for the month. Students created posters to place about the school promoting openness, respect, tolerance and acceptance. As part of their group mission, the Be the Change group provides monthly action/activities to support a positive school climate.

Student of the Month awards were presented for the month of March. Recipients received a gift card, notice in the Tri County News, and picture on the Student of the Month bulletin board for the month.

### Elementary School

Our PBIS focus this month was on "attitude". Teachers did a social lesson that focused on; Being Hopeful/ having Good humor/ Being Joyful/ Be positive /Be confident. We also had our Literacy Night this month. We always have one station the is dedicated to character education for the whole family.

### Community

On Tuesday, March 13, the New Holstein Middle School held our annual Family Fun Night. Activities included the movie "Wonder", art corner, rock climbing wall, and other family friendly physical activities. In addition, raffles and concessions were available to raise funds for upcoming student needs.

### Middle School

The end of March, the whole school met to hold our Student of the 3rd Quarter Assembly to recognize students who stood out in the areas of performance, attitude, participation, effort, and/or improvement. Forty MS students were honored across all subject areas.

### Academic & Career Planning

The District sent a team of administrators and counselors to the New London Career Fair. ## High School

Freshmen and Sophomores took part in ACT Aspire statewide testing this month over a two day period. The assessments are a great indicator future success on the ACT as well as providing great insight into college and career inventory resources. For sophomores, this is very important information during planning for next level opportunities during their end of year counselor/student/parent meetings.

Juniors explored two and four year options with a visit to one of three educational institutions in Fond du Lac at Marian University, UW Fond du Lac, and Moraine Park Technical College.

## Elementary School:

As a school, we earn 20 PAWS and therefore NHES will get another school wide celebration. So, during our Student of the Month assembly last week, we punched our 3rd cup to see what our school wide reward would be. Our 3rd grade student of the month picked "Change your name" Day! Every student and staff will be wearing name tags for the day with different/silly names! The students are very excited for the celebration. ## High School

Our HS PBIS team comprised of school counselor, principal, regular education and special education teachers and staff completed the third of four training sessions for our PBIS implementation. The work will continue into the summer and fall, with rollout coming in phases in the next two years. Funds for training were provided by the Teaming group.

Student Council held their third and final blood drive of the year. As part of the mission of the Student Council to serve others, we were able to increase our donations by 40% over the second drive, resulting in \$1000 in scholarship funds for our students.

In our closing of school assembly, we formally recognized all of our Students of the Month from the year, our Students of the Year by department, and our 4th quarter Community Builder Award Recipients. Over two hundred of our students were again eligible for the awards based on zero discipline and attendance issues.

## Elementary School:

Our last focus for the year was "Fairness". Teachers taught lessons that dealt with; Play by the rules/ Take turns and share/ Be open-minded/ Don't blame others carelessly/ Treat all people fairly/ Teamwork/ Be a good sport. This summer team leaders from the PBIS committee will be going to the State PBIS convention in August. We are excited to learn from other school districts and take our knowledge back to our students.

## Middle School

The end of May, the whole school met to hold our Student of the 4th Quarter Assembly to recognize students who stood out in the areas of performance, attitude, participation, effort, and/or improvement. Forty MS students were honored across all subject areas.

8th graders took part in "Reality Check" in Social Studies. Working with local business owners such as Premier Financial and NH Utilities, students learned about financial management through creating budgets, learning how to care for checking accounts, buy insurance, take out a loan, etc.

## Academic & Career Planning

New programs for the 2018-19 school year include Project Lead the Way courses in grades 6-8 and TEALS for grades 9-11. TEALS goal is to promote computer science in every high school. These programs grow our curriculum options to meet needs of our local community.

Grades 6 and 7 finished their lessons in Career Cruising, as 8th grade completed their Guidance & Careers course making pennants after doing college research.

## Student Family Assistance Program Update

SFAP data to date from Aurora: In 2017-18 school year, 19 families used the Aurora SFAP. In total, families completed 104 appointments. Administrators and counselors have continued to provide pamphlet information to district families along with administrative referrals based on school incidents. When this occurs, school consequences are often held in abeyance in lieu of completing the administrative referrals.
